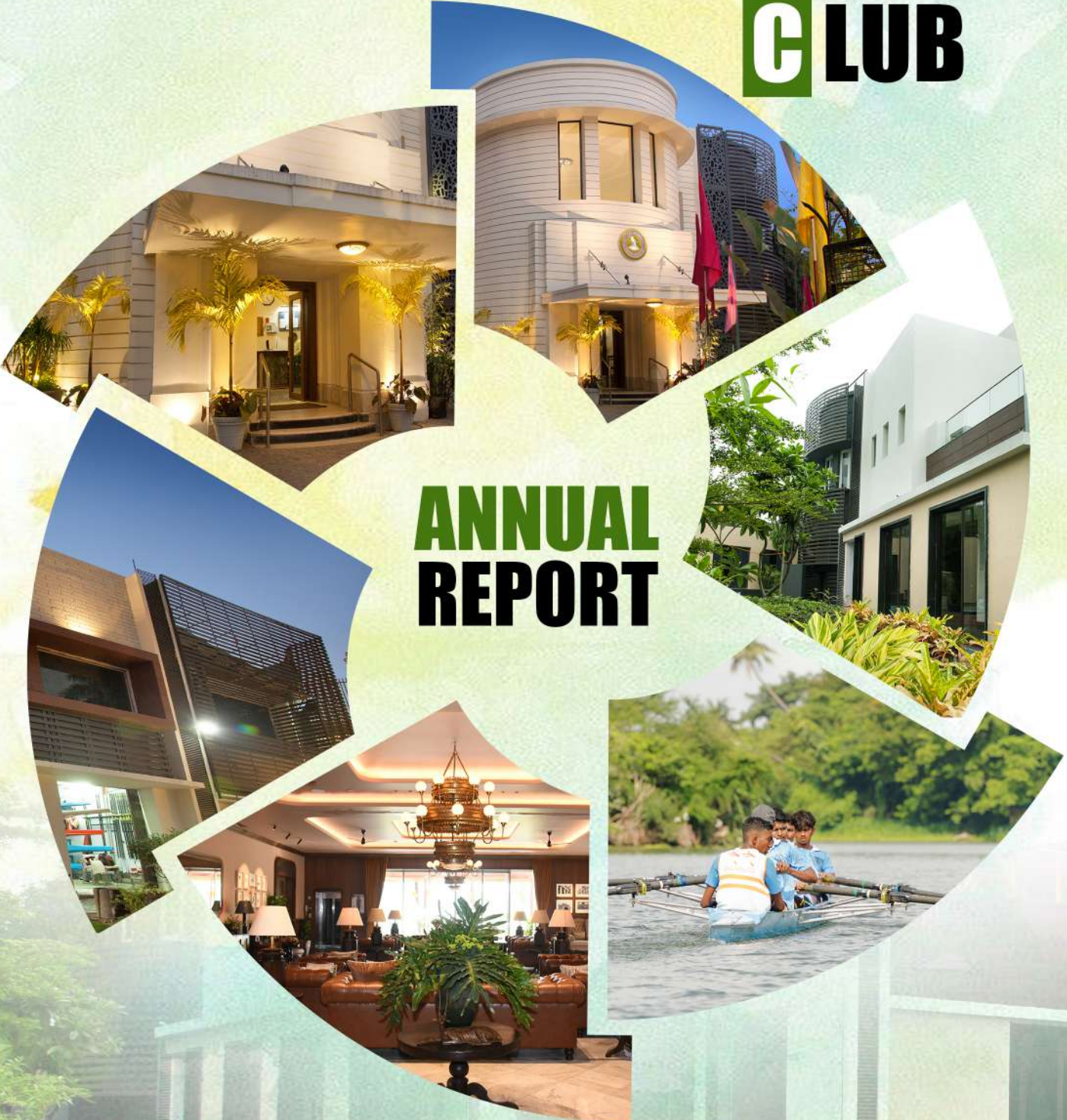

CLUB HISTORY

The journey of the club started way back out of a need that the community felt in constituting a common social platform for the exchange and upkeep of traditions and ideas. A few progressive men came together to form 'The Marwari Club' that took its baby steps and started functioning out of the residence of its first Secretary, Shri Kanai Lalji Jatia, a situation that would repeat itself during the Second World War when the Club was shifted to the residence of another member. The foundation of the Marwari Club was laid on 25th August, 1929. It took six years to finalize all arrangements and the Club took its position at the Rabindra Sarovar Lakes in 1935. The rowing activities of the club were suspended during World War II, between 1942-45, as the premises were required by the army. It took four years and a lot of hard work to re-organize rowing. Under the guidance of its first President, Sir B D Goenka and its illustrious founder members such as Shri Ghanshyam Das ji Birla, Shri Kanai Lalji Jatia, Shri Raghunath Prasad Ji Poddar, Shri Ramprasad ji Rajgaria, Shri Gajananand ji Jatia, Shri Brijmohan Ji Birla, Shri Shiv Kishanji Bhattar, Shri Prabhu Dayalji Himatsinghka, Shri S.K. Chaudhary, Shri Radha Kishanji Chamaria and Shri Ramdhan Dasji Jhahharia, the Club began to spread its wings like a graceful swan. Even though its inspiration was European in nature, it fine tuned the concept to suit its own traditional ethos. In fact, for those times, BRC took some unprecedented steps such as enrolling women members for rowing. Smt. Umaraoji Kheruka was the first lady rowing member, way back in 1937!

In keeping with its name, rowing was one of the earliest sporting activities of the Club. 18 Rowing Boats at the total cost of £125.10 were imported from London in 1936! In 1949, the Club was affiliated to the Amateur Rowing Association of the East (ARAE) and then in 1978, to the Far East Amateur Rowing Association (FEARA). The Club is also the founder member of the West Bengal Rowing Association (WBRA).

With India gaining its independence, the club was re-christened as The Bengal Rowing Club on 9th November, 1948. Given its fast growing reputation as a club that offered a family atmosphere, held on to its Indian roots yet welcomed progressive ideas, membership began to be much sought after from diverse communities such as Punjabis, Gujratis, Bengalis and of course Marwaris.

Over the years, many steps were undertaken to transform your club into a sports club with state of art infrastructure and training facilities.

Today, BRC is as much home to a toddler, as it is to a teenager or a septuagenarian. Not only is it well regarded for its sporting, culinary and social traditions, it also continues to add feathers to its already well plumed cap as it in inching towards the 100 year mark!

President's Desk

Dear Members,

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of you, for having reposed your trust and confidence in me as the President of this esteemed institution. I am truly humbled and will always be grateful for this honour.

It gives me great pleasure to present the Presidents report for the year 2024-25 - a year marked by active engagement, consolidation, and reaffirmation of our commitment to promoting sports, fostering community spirit, and preserving the heritage of our Club.

Rowing continues to be the backbone of the Club's activities, and BRC Rowing has kept the flag flying high. The 21st BRC Students Rowing Championship (BRC SRC) 2025 was organised in May 2025 with a total participation of 207 students from 37 schools. The event was once again a resounding success, with palpable excitement and enthusiasm.

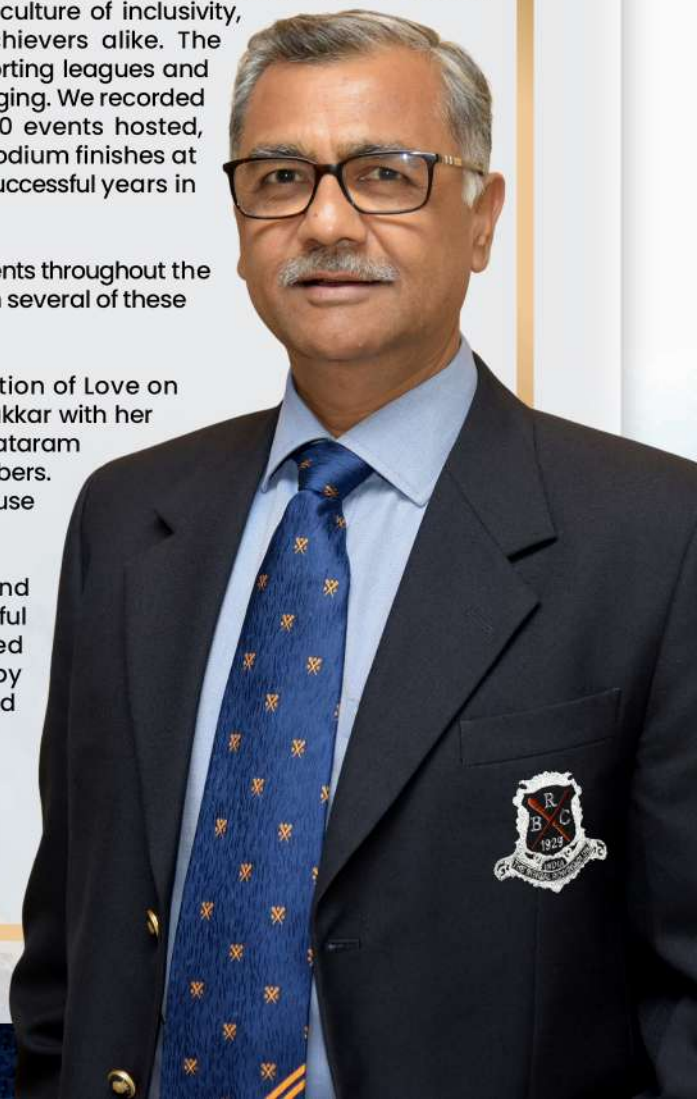
Our rowing teams took part in all the major rowing events, all over the country and abroad. At the 81st ARAE-FEARA Regatta at Chennai, our rowers came back with a rich haul of 7 Gold, 5 Silver and 2 Bronze medals. BRC Teams also excelled at the 44th Junior National & 7th Challenger National Rowing Championship 2024 in Pune, the 25th National Sub Junior Rowing Championship 2024 held at Gorakhpur, and won many laurels, making us proud. Their success and achievement showcases our commitment to promote and develop rowing. We are taking active steps to encourage more members to take up this sport.

The BRC Sporting fraternity showcased extraordinary talent across multiple inter-club and intra-club events. Our members secured top honours in prestigious tournaments such as the CSC Sports Carnival, Saturday Club Sports Carnival, Hindustan Club Sports Carnival and our flagship BRC WESCO Inter-Club Carnival. Team BRC has truly emerged as a formidable sporting powerhouse. The launch of signature events such as the Eklavya Tournament and BRC Champions Day not only fostered high-level competition but also deepened our culture of inclusivity, celebrating young talent, veterans, and international achievers alike. The same spirit was seen at the BRC Marathon & various sporting leagues and intra club competitions all fostering camaraderie and belonging. We recorded unprecedented participation across sports. With over 50 events hosted, more than 4,000 members participating, and numerous podium finishes at inter-club levels, this has been one of the most dynamic and successful years in our sporting history.

Your Club organised and hosted a variety of entertainment events throughout the year, catering to all age groups and of various genres with several of these events offered complimentary to members.

There were musical evenings like Chaand ... The Inspiration of Love on Sharad Purnima, Haiyat Khan with his folk dhuns, Aakriti Kakkar with her Bollywood tunes, Andaz-e-Rafi by Prasan Rao and Vande Mataram - a patriotic show curated and performed by our own members. Raj Kapoor-The Fabulous Showman, was another in-house production that drew a packed house.

Nayab Midha mesmerised the audience with her poetry and humour, while Kuch Ankahe Alfaz by Marham blended soulful music and poetry. This Holi Sammelan we experimented with a new genre of artists, while plays like Kaikeyi by Anjana Chandak and A Few Angry Women captivated audiences.



The Diwali Tambola had 1000 members and guests enjoying the evening. Christmas Carnival – Merry Circus saw over 4800 visitors across two days. The Farmers Market – Cherry Blossom attracted more than 2000 attendees. Other highlights included the JK Tyre Car Rally, Linc Sit & Draw for children, Golden Adda for senior members, and insightful talks by eminent doctors Dr. Nageshwar Reddy and Dr. Anjan Siotia. We also hosted an engaging session with noted politician and speaker Dr. Subramanian Swamy. Kidsology curated creative activities such as the Art Carnival, Halloween, Winter Camp by the Lakes and personality development programmes for children.

Significant infrastructure projects were undertaken this year. The Catering Office was completely renovated, improving both staff efficiency and the member experience. Smart electricity meters were installed across departments to help monitor and reduce power costs. The children's play area was fully revamped and covered for year-round usability. This should provide the young BRCians with a much better and safer play environment.

The swimming pool changing rooms for both men and women were renovated, with massage rooms added in each. This project overshot its completion target causing inconvenience to the members. I would like to thank the members for their patience and understanding. However, I am sure the new facilities will be found more comfortable.

I am pleased to inform that we successfully concluded wage agreement negotiations with the Unions, ensuring harmonious relations, with the agreement valid for the next four years.


BRC catering remains a hallmark of quality, with high standards in food, presentation, and service. New menu additions were well received, with the pistachio ice cream becoming particularly popular. Food festivals, including the Chaat Gully, have become anticipated highlights. While rising costs remain a challenge, the team continues to work on cost-control measures.

BRC now enjoys regular coverage in the print media and is active across social media platforms. I encourage members to follow us online. Our revamped BRC app now allows easy bill payments, event bookings, sports slot reservations, and table bookings. A QR code entry system has also been introduced.

I express my gratitude to all Past Presidents for their guidance and support, the Governing Body and sub-committees for their tireless work and the statutory authorities – KMDA, KMC, Kolkata Police – for their cooperation. My thanks also to our sponsors and media partners for their continued trust.

Over the past year, BRC Kidsology has been a hub of imagination, learning, and joyful exploration. With a thoughtful mix of interactive sessions, engaging events and creative workshops, children were encouraged to dive into new experiences and broaden their horizons. Whether it was celebrating traditions, building life skills, or unleashing artistic talents, each initiative was designed to spark curiosity and confidence. The year unfolded as a vibrant tapestry of learning moments, leaving children enriched, empowered and excited for what lies ahead.

Our year started with a step into our cultural journey. **Pujor Hullor** was a joyful celebration that immersed children in the spirit of Durga Puja through stories of Maa Durga, soulful shlok chanting and energetic bhajan jamming. The event blended tradition with fun, offering exciting games, festive crafts and a heartwarming aarti that brought everyone together. With laughter, learning and devotion, the children experienced the vibrant essence of the pujo season in a truly memorable way.



Continuing with October festivities, a spooky celebration of **Halloween** for about 150+ kids was organised. They enjoyed costume contests, spooky balloons, crafts and eerie stories. With games & activities like Halloween Bingo, Pumpkin Hunt and Spider Web Obstacle, it was an evening to remember. Teens 12 and above danced to Halloween hits at this lively Halloween Dance Party. BRC Kidsology hosted an engaging **Financial Literacy Workshop** for children aged 3 to 9, with around 40 enthusiastic participants. Through fun activities, games and storytelling, the young learners were introduced to basic money concepts like saving, spending and sharing. The workshop aimed to build early awareness about money management in an age-appropriate way, making learning both meaningful and enjoyable for the little minds.



December in BRC was all about creativity and experiences. The **Art Carnival** was a vibrant celebration of creativity, welcoming over 400 children and their families for a day of artistic exploration. Guided by 12 expert artists, kids engaged in unique activities like glow-in-the-dark painting at the Neon Art House, edible slime play, jute Christmas ornament-making, digital art on sippers and impasto knife painting. 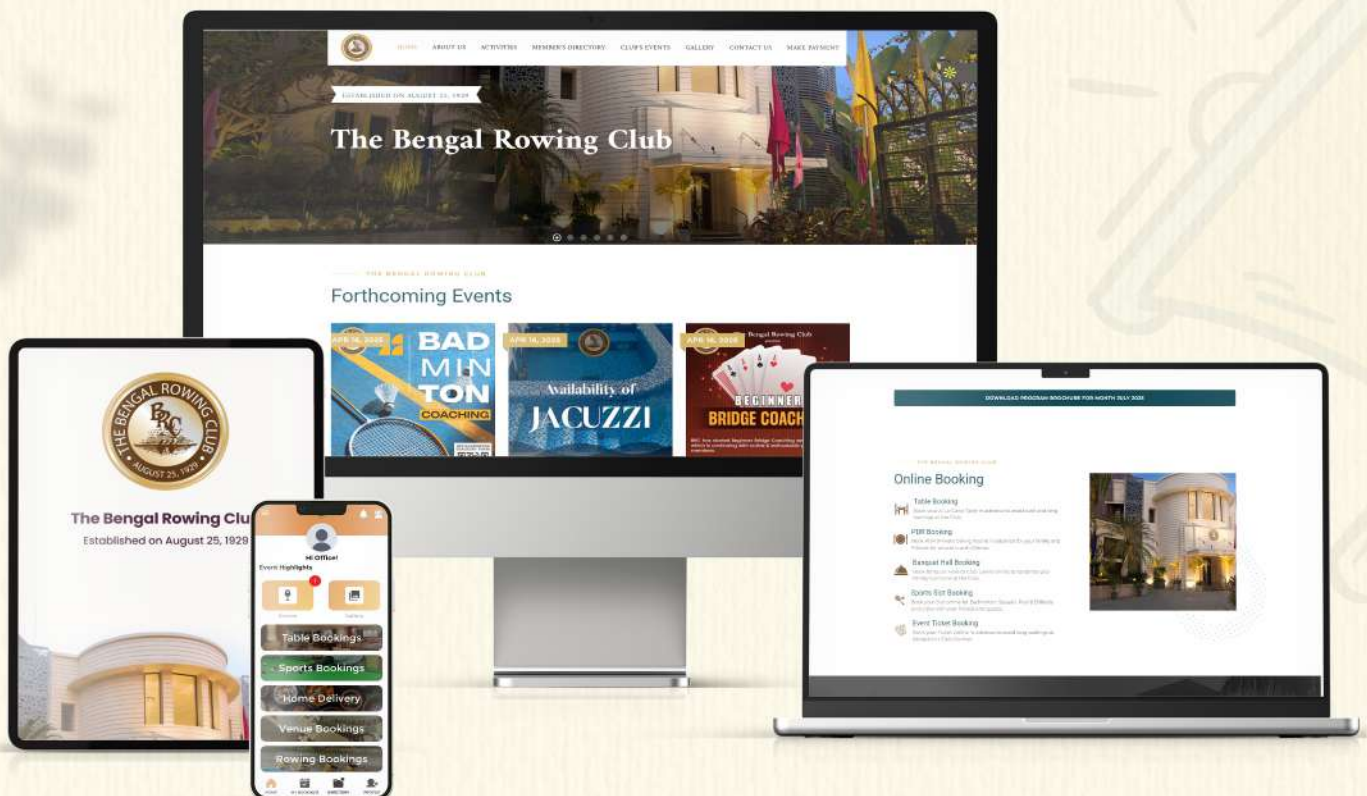


Communications

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of The Bengal Rowing Club Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

OPINION

We have audited the accompanying Financial Statements of The Bengal Rowing Club ("the Club"), which comprise the Balance Sheet as at March 31, 2025, the Statement of Income & Expenditure and Cash Flow Statement for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the aforesaid Financial Statements give the information required by the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act") in the manner so required and give a true and fair view in conformity with the accounting principles generally accepted in India, of the state of affairs of the Club as at March 31, 2025, its deficit and its cash flows for the year ended on that date.

BASIS FOR OPINION

We conducted our audit of the financial statements in accordance with the Standards on Auditing (SAs), as specified under section 143(10) of the Act. Our responsibilities under those Standards are further described in the 'Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements' section of our report. We are independent of the Club in accordance with the 'Code of Ethics' issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India together with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements under the provisions of the Act and the Rules thereunder, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the Code of Ethics. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion on the financial statements.

EMPHASIS OF MATTER

We draw attention to Note 22C of the financial statements regarding the reassessment of the useful life of certain building components related to interior renovation, for the reasons described in the said note. This change, based on management's judgment, is effective from 1st April 2024 and has resulted in an increase of ₹ 51,77,024.02 in depreciation expense and the loss for the year ended 31st March 2025. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

OTHER INFORMATION

The Club's Governing Body is responsible for the preparation of the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Management Discussion and Analysis, Governing Body's Report including Annexures to Governing Body's Report, but does not include the Financial Statements and our auditor's report thereon.

Our opinion on the Financial Statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the Financial Statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the Financial Statements or our knowledge obtained during the course of our audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF MANAGEMENT FOR THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The Club's Governing Body is responsible for the matters stated in section 134(5) of the Act with respect to the preparation of these Financial Statements that give a true and fair view of the financial position, financial performance and cash flows of the Club in accordance with the accounting principles generally accepted in India, specified under section 133 of the Act read with Rule 7 of the Companies (Accounts) Rules, 2014. This responsibility also includes maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the provisions of the Act for safeguarding the assets of the Club and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities, selection and application of appropriate accounting policies, making judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent, and the design, implementation and maintenance of adequate

internal financial controls, that were operating effectively for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the Financial Statements that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the Financial Statements, management is responsible for assessing the Club's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Club or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so. Those charged with governance are also responsible for overseeing the Club's financial reporting process.

Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Club to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

Materiality is the magnitude of misstatements in the financial statements that, individually or in aggregate, makes it probable that the economic decisions of a reasonably knowledgeable user of the financial statements may be influenced. We consider quantitative materiality and qualitative factors in (i) planning the scope of our audit work and in evaluating the results of our work; and (ii) to evaluate the effect of any identified misstatements in the financial statements.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

We also provide those charged with governance with a statement that we have complied with relevant ethical requirements regarding independence, and to communicate with them all relationships and other matters that may reasonably be thought to bear on our independence, and where applicable, related safeguards.

REPORT ON OTHER LEGAL AND REGULATORY REQUIREMENTS

 - (a) We have sought and obtained all the information and explanations which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purposes of our audit;
 - (b) In our opinion, proper books of account as required by law have been kept by the Club so far as it appears from our examination of those books except for the matters stated in the paragraph 2(h)(vi) below on reporting under Rule 11(g) of the Companies (Audit and Auditors) Rules, 2014;
 - (c) The Balance Sheet, the Statement of Income and Expenditure, the Cash Flow Statement and Statement of Changes in Equity dealt with by this Report are in agreement with the books of account;
 - (d) In our opinion, the aforesaid Financial Statements comply with the Accounting Standards specified under Section 133 of the Act, read with Companies (Accounting Standard) Rules, 2021.
 - (e) On the basis of the written representations received from the Governing Body's members as on March 31, 2025 taken on record by the Governing Body, none of the Governing Body's members is disqualified as on March 31, 2025 from being appointed as a Governing Body's members in terms of Section 164(2) of the Act;

 - ii. The Club did not have any long-term contracts including derivative contracts for which there were any material foreseeable losses.
 - iii. There was no amount which was required to be transferred to the Investor Education and Protection Fund by the Club.
- iv. A) The management has represented that, to the best of its knowledge and belief, other than as disclosed in the notes to the accounts, no funds have been advanced or loaned or invested (either from borrowed funds or share premium or any other sources or kind of funds) by the club to or in any other person(s) or entity(ies), including foreign entities ("Intermediaries"), with the understanding, whether recorded in writing or otherwise, that the Intermediary shall, whether, directly or indirectly lend or invest in other persons or entities identified in any manner whatsoever by or on behalf of the Club ("Ultimate Beneficiaries") or provide any guarantee, security or the like on behalf of the Ultimate Beneficiaries;

- v. This being a company registered under Section 8 of the Companies Act, 2013, declaration/ payment of dividend is not applicable. Hence, reporting on compliance with section 123 of the Companies Act, 2013, is not required.
- vi. Based on our examination which included test checks, the company has used Clubman for maintaining its books of account which have a feature of recording audit trail (edit log) facility and have been operated throughout the year for all relevant transactions recorded throughout the year, except that:
 - a. The audit trail feature at the application level was enabled on March 11, 2024. However, audit logs were generated and retained only from September 2024 onwards. Therefore, the audit trail was effectively functional and auditable only from September 2024.
 - b. no audit trail feature was enabled at the database level throughout the year to log any direct data changes.

Further, other than as mentioned in para vi (a) and (b) above, during the course of our examination we did not come across any instance of audit trail feature being tampered with.

It is further noted that the audit trail has been preserved only at the application level from September 2024 onwards. The audit trail feature was not enabled at the database level during the year, and accordingly, no logs are retained in respect of any direct changes to the database.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Corporate Information

The Bengal Rowing Club ("the Club") is company limited by guarantee and is registered as a company under Section 8 of the Companies Act, 2013. The Objective of the Club is to afford to its Members facilities for boat rowing and to provide for its Members, as far as possible, the usual privileges, advantages and amenities of the Club.

1. Significant Accounting Policies

i. Basis of Accounting & Preparation of Financial Statements

The Financial Statements of the Club have been prepared on a going concern and accrual basis under the historical cost convention, in accordance with the generally accepted accounting principle in India and provisions of the Companies Act, 2013, as adopted consistently by the Club. The Club is a Small and Medium Sized Company (SMC) as defined in the Companies (Accounting Standards) Rules, 2021 notified under the Companies Act, 2013. Accordingly, the Company has complied with the Accounting Standards as applicable to a Small and Medium Sized Company.

ii. Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements require judgments, estimates and assumptions to be made that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities including contingent liabilities on the date of the financial statements and the reported amount of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Difference between actual results and estimates are recognized in the period in which the results are known / materialized.

iii. Recognition of Income and Expenditure

All expenses and income to the extent considered payable and receivable respectively unless specifically stated to be otherwise are accounted for on mercantile basis. Interest on Deep Discount Bond is accounted for on maturity. Entrance fees have been directly credited to Reserves & Surplus. Grants received on account of capital expenditure are deducted from the cost of the related assets.

iv. Property, Plant and Equipment

a) Property, Plant and Equipment

- i) Property, Plant and Equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment loss, if any. Cost comprises of purchase cost together with incidental expenditure of purchase and installation.
- ii) Depreciation on Property, Plant and Equipment, have been charged on straight line method considering the useful life of Property, Plant and Equipment as prescribed in Schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013. Crockery & Cutleries are charged to expense, except in certain components of the building capitalized on account of renovation in form of revamping, modernization and remodeling of the interiors, where life has been considered as 10 years.
- iii) Profit or loss on disposal/discard of Property, Plant and Equipment is recognized in Statement of Income & Expenditure.

b) Intangible Assets and amortization

Intangible assets i.e. software acquired expected to provide future enduring economic benefits are stated at cost less accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment loss, if any. Software are amortized over a period of six years. All up gradation / enhancements are charged off as revenue unless they bring significant additional benefits.

c) Capital Work in Progress

Capital Work in progress is stated at cost which includes expenses incurred during construction period and other expenses incurred in connection with project implementation in so far as such expenses relates the period prior to the commencement of commercial production.

v. Inventories

Stock of stores is valued at lower of cost or net realizable value. Cost comprises of expenditure incurred in normal course of business in bringing inventories to their present location. Cost is determined on 'Weighted Average' basis.

vi) Investments

- a) Investments which are readily realizable and intended to be held for not more than one year from the date on which such investments are made, are classified as current investments. All other investments are classified as long-term investments. The portion of long-term investments expected to be realized within twelve months after the reporting date are disclosed under current investments.
- b) Long-Term Investments are stated at cost. Provision for diminution is made if the decline in value, in the opinion of the management, is other than temporary.
- c) Premium paid on purchase of investments are amortized over the life of the investment.
- d) Current Investments, other than the portion of long-term investments disclosed under current investments, are stated at lower of cost or fair value.

vii) Employee Benefits

- a) Employee benefits of short-term nature are recognized as expense in the Statement of Income & Expenditure as and when it accrues.
- b) Post-employment benefits in the nature of defined contribution plan are recognized as expenses as and when it accrues. Post-employment benefits in the nature of defined benefit plans are recognized as expenses in the Statement of Income & Expenditure based on actuarial valuation.
- c) Actuarial gains and losses are recognized immediately in the Statement of Income & Expenditure as Income or Expenses.

viii) Impairment

An asset is treated as impaired when the carrying cost of assets exceeds its recoverable value. An impairment loss is charged to the Statement of Income & Expenditure for the year in which an asset is identified as impaired. The impairment loss recognized in prior accounting periods is adjusted if there has been a change in the estimate of the recoverable amount.

ix) Provisions, Contingent Liabilities and Contingent Assets

Provisions are recognized when there is a present obligation as a result of amount of a past event that probably requires an outflow of resources and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. Disclosure of contingent liability is made when there is a possible obligation or a present obligation that may, but probably will not, require an outflow of resources. No provision is recognized or disclosure of contingent liability is made when there is a possible obligation or present obligation and the likelihood of outflow of resources is remote. Contingent Assets is neither recognized nor disclosed in the financial statements.

NOTE 22 - NOTES ON ACCOUNTS

A. Rights & Preferences attached to Members

Every ordinary member of the Club shall contribute to the assets of the Club in the event of its being wound up during the period of his membership or within a year of his ceasing to be a member, such amount as may be required, but not exceeding Rs.0.05 thousand for paying off the debts and liabilities of the Club contracted before he ceased to be a member and for the cost, charges and expenses of the winding up and for equalizing the liability of the contributors amongst themselves.

B. Renewal of Leasehold Agreement

After 1979, formal 5-yearly renewal of the lease agreement of land on which the premises are constructed is yet to be concluded with the Kolkata Metropolitan Development Authority (KMDA). In the meantime, the KMDA is revising the rent at periodical intervals and currently revised lease rent of Rs.1,886.77 thousand per annum is being paid and accepted by the KMDA.

C. Property, Plant and Equipment

During the year, the Club reassessed the useful life of certain components of the building capitalized from the financial year 2018-19, particularly those related to renovation in form of revamping, modernization, and remodelling, etc. of the interiors, based on management's evaluation and judgment. Pursuant to this reassessment, the useful life of such assets has been revised to 10 years with effect from 1st April 2024. Based on the revised useful life, depreciation has been recalculated on the written down value of these assets on a prospective basis in accordance with the requirement of the accounting standards. The revised depreciation has been accounted for from the current financial year. This reassessment of useful life, has resulted in an overall increase of ₹ 5,177.02 thousand in depreciation expense and loss for the year ended 31st March 2025.
